From the Survivor Outreach Services Coordinator

Did you know...?

The Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) is one of several organizations, such as MOAA, that supports Survivors of fallen military service members by advocating for policy and legislation to improve programs and services provided by the Federal, State, and Local government agencies.

Some of the legislative priorities this year for TAPS include the following:

Pass Landmark Toxic Exposure Legislation

TAPS supports the passing of the COST Of War Act (S. 3003) and the Honoring Our PACT Act (H.R. 3967). These Senate and House landmark bills will ensure veterans exposed to toxins and airborne hazards get immediate, lifelong access to VA healthcare.

Introduce Comprehensive Remarriage Bill

This bill will remove the age requirement of waiting until age 55 to remarry in order to retain military benefits. The bill will allow surviving spouses to retain Fry Scholarship and Dependents Education Assistance (DEA) education benefits; allow remarried surviving spouses to keep Commissary and Exchange benefits; and, allow surviving spouses to reinstate TRICARE benefits if the remarriage ends in death or divorce.

Honor All Gold Star Families

The Gold Star Families Day Act advocated for by TAPS will enact a federal holiday as a national day of remembrance for those who have lost a service member while serving or from a service-connected injury or illness, regardless of manner of death, location, or time of death.

TAPS is just one of many organizations with whom Survivor Outreach Services works to ensure the needs of our Survivors receive the necessary awareness. Doing so not only improves the wellbeing of our Survivors, but also assures our Survivors that they are forever part of our military family.

One last thing before closing, April 5th is Gold Star Spouses Day. Along with many others, Survivor Outreach Services honors our Gold Star Spouses and remembers the ultimate sacrifice paid by our service members on this day and every day. To our surviving spouses reading this, know that you are forever in our thoughts and prayers and we will forever remember your service member. If you know a Gold Star Spouse, reach out and let her or him know you are thinking about them.

Legislative Liaison Update

It is springtime in DC. Our legislators will be in their district for their Easter break this month. They just passed an omnibus funding bill. This makes it a good time for us to Thank them for all they do for us.

The TriCare cost controls, suspension of cuts to uniformed medical personnel, and toxic exposure provisions in the NDAA are all held hostage due to the lack of an approved NDAA budget.

This year's MOAA Advocacy in Action event will be virtual again during April. The focused week will be April 25th through 29th. Be watching for MOAA communications detailing this year's topics.

We can anticipate that military pay parity and TriCare / healthcare cost controls will be highlighted again this year.

As the world watches and reacts to Mr. Putin and his actions in the Ukraine, we must continue to be the voice for our men and women in uniform.

MOAA's Legislative Priorities for 2022

- Sustain pay raises and adequate BAH for the troops and COLA raises for retirees.
- Ensure the Coast Guard, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and Public Health Service continue to receive pay during a government shutdown.
- Protect the value of the military health care benefit.
- Protect the Military Health System pharmacy benefit, and achieve flexibility in TRICARE pharmacy copays.
- Address barriers to accessing care within the MHS, including TRICARE coverage gaps and mental health care access challenges.
- Protect family support programs, and ensure military-provided services (housing, PCS, child care, youth programs, financial counseling) are readily available and meet standards for quality and costs.
- Achieve equity of benefits, protections, and administrative support for Guard/Reserve members consistent with their active-duty counterparts.
- Sustain Veterans Health Administration (VHA) foundational missions and services.
- Reform the presumptive process to support veterans claiming service-connected disabilities for toxic exposures.
- Achieve concurrent receipt of service-earned retirement pay and VA disability pay.
- Protect full military honors and burial at Arlington National Cemetery for those currently eligible.
- Improve Survivor Benefits.
- Support a quality transition experience from active duty to veteran status for all servicemembers.
- Recognize the pandemic continues to affect the lives of our servicemembers.

MOAA accomplishments in 2021

- Repealing SBP-DIC offset, known as the 'Widows Tax' saving up to \$12,000 per year for nearly 67,000 surviving spouses.
- Executing a credible game plan for oversight of DoD's health care protecting continued access to quality care.*
- <u>Securing comprehensive privatized military housing reform</u> improving housing, establishing Tenant Bill of Rights, and Congressional oversight.*
- <u>Lessening impact of TRICARE fee hikes</u> (Family = \$300 vice \$900) fighting multiple efforts to end grandfathering for those who entered service before Jan. 1, 2018.*
- Protecting TRICARE For Life (TFL) blocked five consecutive administration budgets proposing TFL enrollment fees (2013-2017).*
- <u>Maintaining pay raise comparability</u> ensuring pay raises for our uniformed services keep pace with civilian sector increases.*
- <u>Providing Wounded Warrior protections and caregiver enhancements</u> securing multiple improvements to VA caregiver programs.*
- <u>Defeating 'COLA Minus 1 Percent'</u> ending Congressional attempts to reduce retired pay, costing an E-7 retiring after 20 years \$83,000, and an O-5 \$124,000, by age 62.*
- Securing major GI Bill upgrades to include transferability and improving benefits for National Guard on Title 32 orders.*
- <u>Boosting compensation significantly for retirees with 50% VA disability</u> still fighting for the rest to include those medically retired.*
- Improving Guard and Reserve TRICARE coverage and securing a premium cut.
- Ensuring Guard and Reserve retirement age credit for active duty service now allowing 90 days to stretch over two consecutive years.

From the Chapter Chaplain

SOLDIERS ALSO NEED GOD.

Sometimes civilians forget that soldiers are people too. While it is true that your lives are more disciplined and usually mission focused, soldiers also need God! Nowhere is this better illustrated than in the life of the Roman



Centurion Cornelius. As you know, Rome conquered and occupied the nation of Israel. Jews despised and feared them, especially a Centurion, who was the principal professional officer in the armies of ancient Rome and its empire. The centurion was the commander of a *centuria*, the smallest unit of a Roman legion. A Roman legion was nominally composed of 6,000 soldiers, and each legion was divided up into 10 cohorts, with each cohort containing 6 *centuria consisting of 100 men each*. Often these soldiers were the brutal "face" of Rome among the Jewish population. How unusual it was that the Jews would love and revere a centurion!

Luke's historical record, Acts, chapter ten, describes him this way, "Now there was a man at Caesarea named Cornelius, a centurion of what was called the Italian cohort, a devout man and one who feared God with all his household, and gave many alms to the Jewish people and prayed to God continually." Cornelius was the kind of man everyone hopes would attend their church! And yet, his soul was troubled. However good and religious he could be, Cornelius still needed something more. That something was the good news about Jesus. Being religious

and well thought of was not enough.

Luke continues writing, "About the ninth hour of the day Cornelius clearly saw in a vision an angel of God who had just come in and said to him, 'Cornelius!' and fixing his gaze on him and being much alarmed, he said, 'What is it, Lord?' And he said to him, 'Your prayers and alms have ascended as a memorial before God. Now dispatch some men to Joppa and send for a man named Simon, who is also called Peter; he is staying with a tanner named Simon, whose house is by the sea.' "Cornelius sent for Peter saying, "I sent for you immediately, and you have been kind enough to come. Now then, we are all here present before God to hear all that you have been commanded by the Lord.'?" After recounting the recent events of Jesus' life, death, burial, and resurrection, Peter reminded Cornelius of what the Scriptures had foretold, "'Of Him all the prophets bear witness that through His name everyone who believes in Him receives forgiveness of sins.'

" Cornelius and his entire household heard and believed the good news about Jesus! "While Peter was still speaking these words, the Holy Spirit fell upon all those who were listening to the message." Cornelius understood the chain of command and was ready to obey and put his trust in the good news of Jesus! Hopefully that will be true of each one of us! Like Cornelius, we must understand and accept that Jesus is the only Savior who died on our behalf and rose again, satisfying all of God's requirements for righteousness and justice. Because of Him, God may offer us forgiveness and acceptance.

Military Officers Association of America Scholarship Program for Academic Year- Fall 2022

Lincoln Land Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America ("MOAA") announces its Scholarship Program for the Academic Year which begins in the Fall 2022. The Scholarship Program for Academic Year-Fall 2022 award shall be made solely based on an Applicant's submission in response to this announcement. No other criteria will be considered.

I. INFORMATION FOR THE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR ACADEMIC YEAR- FALL 2022.

A. The Scholarship Program for Academic Year- Fall 2022 essay topic shall be:

"Reflections on those who Serve America"

- B. There will be **one** Scholarship Award in the amount of: \$2,000.00.
- C. To be considered, Applicant essay and required documents **must be postmarked on or before Jun 1, 2022** and mailed (no other form of delivery is permissible) to:

- D. The Scholarship Program Award Winner will be contacted not later than July 2022, and the award presentation date will be during the Chapter's Island Bay Yacht Club event.
- E. In satisfaction of the Scholarship Program, Applicant shall attend a meeting or event of a military or veteran's organization or military institution, spending sufficient time with the members of the organization to prepare observations. Following the activity, the applicant will write an essay (see essay requirements below) on that organization or event, and what they learned about the service, sacrifice and commitment of current or former military members to their country. Organizations or events could include the following or similar activities: (Applicant should not attend events or facilities which would cast MOAA in an unfavorable light.)
- 1. Attend drill with a local National Guard or Reserve unit, interacting with unit leaders and others.
- 2. Attend a veteran's discussion group at a local veteran's center.
- 3. Spend time with a college ROTC unit.
- 4. Volunteer at the Illinois Military Museum or similar institution.

- 5. The following items constitute the Applicant's Scholarship Program for Academic Year- Fall 2022 submission. Only those Applicant submissions that contain ALL items listed below will be eligible for consideration:
- 6. The scholarship essay will be type-written on the announced topic and in accordance with the instructions in paragraph E, above. The essay shall contain a minimum of 1,000 words and a maximum of 1,500 words. Applicant shall develop the topic as they deem appropriate, however, the essay must be the original and exclusive work of the Applicant.
- 7. CERTIFICATION of relationship to a Lincoln Land Chapter MOAA Member and Applicant Age. (The enclosure to this announcement shall be used for this purpose.)
- 8. The designation of an institution of higher education that Applicant will be attending in the Fall 2022. Applicant must provide the name and address of the institution of higher education Applicant is, or will be, enrolled in for the Fall 2022 semester (or equivalent).

F. ELIGIBILITY.

- A. An Applicant to this Scholarship Program for Academic Year- Fall 2022 can be a Member or the: spouse; natural, adopted or foster child; stepchild; grandchild; great grandchild or parent of any Member of the Lincoln Land Chapter MOAA. A Member of Lincoln Chapter MOAA is a person who meets the membership requirements specified in Article IV of the Lincoln Land Chapter MOAA Bylaws and who is considered "in good standing" (current in payment of Chapter dues).
- B. Applicant must be at least 18 years of age on or before September 1, 2022.
- C. Applicant must be enrolled in, or accepted for enrollment into an institution of higher education for the Fall 2022 semester (or equivalent) for a minimum of nine semester hours or equivalency. An institution of higher education may be a program, junior college, college, university, technical or trade school, which awards a degree, diploma or certification upon completion of its curriculum. Providing the institution meets the foregoing requirement, the Scholarship Award shall be made without regard to Awardee's academic level. As example, an Awardee may be a Ph.D. candidate, a graduate or undergraduate student, a junior college student, or a student at a trade school. For at least six of the nine qualifying semester hours (or equivalent) Applicant must be scheduled to attend courses in a resident, as differing from on-line (Internet) course enrollment status.
- D. An Awardee may not be considered for another Scholarship Award for five years or until August, 2027.

G. GENERAL INFORMATION.

A. Only essays prepared in Word® can be accepted. Applicant must be prepared to submit an electronic version of their essay at the request of the Scholarship Committee Chairperson.

- B. The Chapter Scholarship Committee will judge essays on the basis of grammar, spelling, topical development and presentation. The essay will be formatted in accordance with the latest Modern Language Association (MLA) guidance.
- C. Essays shall be evaluated using *Harbrace College Handbook* and *Webster's New World Dictionary* as guides. Sources used in the essay must be properly cited.

The Certification page, the enclosure to this announcement, shall be used as the cover page for Applicant essays. No title page or any other form of essay identification shall be used.

- D. Applicant must designate and provide evidence of their acceptance into, or attendance at, an institution of higher education. Items considered to meet this requirement include acceptance letters, recent grade reports, or similar official documents. Based on this information, the Chapter Scholarship Committee shall determine if the residency requirement has been or will be met.
- E. All decisions made by the Chapter Scholarship Committee are final.
- F. All Applicant submissions become the exclusive property of the Lincoln Land Chapter MOAA.
- G. Lincoln Land Chapter MOAA will not be responsible for any delays in receiving Applicant submissions.
- H. If no Applicant essays are received; or if, in the judgment of the Chapter Scholarship Committee, the submissions are inadequate; or if the Scholarship Program Award Winner is later determined to be ineligible for Scholarship Award, the Scholarship Award may be suspended for that Award Year.
- I. The Awardee will be notified in advance, and will be requested to attend, as a guest, a Chapter meeting to be recognized as the Scholarship Program Award Winner.
- J. The Scholarship Program will be given maximum publicity by the Chapter and may include newspaper articles, Award presentation at commencement exercises, notification to school officials and other actions deemed appropriate. Awardee agrees to reasonably participate in such activities.
- K. Any tax liability resulting from an Award shall be the sole responsibility of the Awardee.
- L. In the event circumstances prevent the Awardee from attending an institution of higher education at the beginning of Academic Year-Fall 2022, providing Awardee meets the eligibility requirements in paragraph II C (for any semester equivalent through Spring 2023) the Awardee retains the right to receive this Scholarship Amount.
